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Prof. Nancy Fraser

Prof. Nancy Fraser is Henry A. and Louise Loeb Professor at the New School for Social Research, Visiting Research Professor at Dartmouth College, and holds an international research chair at the Collège d'étudesmondiales. Trained as a philosopher, she specializes in critical social theory and political philosophy. Her newest book is *Cannibal Capitalism:How our System is Devouring Democracy, Care and the Planet—and what we can do about it* (Verso, 2021).

Prof. Fraser is the author of *The Old is Dying* (Verso, 2019), *Fortunes of Feminism*: From State-Managed Capitalism to Neoliberal Crisis (Verso, 2013), Scales of Justice: Reimagining Political Space in a Globalizing World (Polity, 2008), Mapping the Radical Imagination: Between Redistribution and Recognition (Cambridge, 2003), Justice Interruptus: Critical Reflections on the "Postsocialist" Condition (Routledge, 1997), and Unruly Practices: Power, Discourse and Gender in Contemporary Social Theory (University of Minnesota Press, 1989). She has also co-authored Feminism for the 99%: A Manifesto (Verso, 2019) with CinziaArruzza and Tithi Bhattacharya, Capitalism: A Conversation in Critical Theory (Polity, 2018) with RahelJaeggi, Redistribution or Recognition? A Political-Philosophical Exchange (Verso, 2003) with Axel Honneth, and Philosophical Exchange (Routledge, Feminist Contentions: A1994), with SeylaBenhabib, Judith Butler, and Drucilla Cornell. Other works include Adding Insult to *Injury: Nancy Fraser Debates Her Critics* (Verso, 2008), edited by Kevin Olson, *Qu'est*ce que la justice sociale? Reconnaissance et redistribution. Éditionétablie et introduction par Estelle Ferrarese (Paris: La Découverte, 2005), Pragmatism, Critique, Judgment:

Essays for Richard J. Bernstein, co-edited with SeylaBenhabib (MIT Press, 2004), and Revaluing French Feminism: Critical Essays on Difference, Agency, and Culture, co-edited with Sandra Bartky (Indiana University Press, 1992), to name a few.

Prof. Fraser has theorized capitalism's relation to racial oppression, social reproduction, ecological crisis, feminist movements, and the rise of rightwing populism in a series of linked essays in *New Left Review*, *Critical Historical Studies*, *American Affairs*, and in *Fortunes of Feminism: From State-Managed Capitalism to Neoliberal Crisis* (2013).

Prof. Fraser has made unparalleled contributions to the fields of social and political theory, feminist theory, and contemporary French and German thought. She is the recipient of the Doctor Honoris Causa from the National University of Cordoba (Argentina). Professor Fraser held a "Blaise Pascal International Research Chair" at the École des hautes études en sciences sociales in Paris in 2008-2010. She has also received fellowships from the Stanford Humanities Center, the Bunting Institute, the ACLS, the Humanities Research Institute at the University of California-Irvine, the Institutfür die Wissenschaftenvom Menschen in Vienna, the Wissenchaftskollegzu Berlin, and the American Academy in Berlin. She has taught at Northwestern University, Johann Wolfgang Goethe-Universität in Frankfurt Germany, the University of Paris, the University of Groningen (The Netherlands), and University of the Balearic Islands, Palma de Mallorca.

Professor Fraser has delivered numerous endowed lectures, including the Tanner Lecture on Human Values (Stanford), the Spinoza Lectures (Amsterdam), the Miliband Lecture (LSE), the Gilbert Ryle Lectures (Trent), the Mary Wollstonecraft Lecture (Hull), the JinYuelin Lectures (Beijing), the Storrs Lectures (Yale Law School), the Messenger

Lectures (Cornell), the GiambattistaVico Lecture (York), the Leibniz Lecture (University of Vienna), the Frankfurt Lectures, and the Patten Lectures (Indiana).

In 2011, she was Humanitas Visiting Professor of Women's Rights at Kings College, Cambridge University and Donald W. Gordon Fellow at the Stellenbosch Institute for Advanced Studies in South Africa.

Her work has been translated into more than twenty languages and was cited twice by the Brazilian Supreme Court (in decisions upholding marriage equality and affirmative action). A Chevalier of the French Legion of Honor, a Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and a past President of the American Philosophical Association, Eastern Division, she is the recipient of six honorary degrees, the Alfred Schutz Prize for Social Philosophy, and the NessimHabif World Prize.
